References / The Art of Going Slowly in Kyoto


Wabi-Sabi is at the heart of Japanese aesthetics. Wabi, or tranquil simplicity, is refinement through simplicity, rustic elegance, nobleness without sophistication*; Sabi is the patina of time, and the total abandonment to nostalgia and romanticism when confronted with aesthetic manifestations of Nature and Passing Time. An art embodied by Raku, whose history goes back to 16th century Kyoto, where a great tea-master had these unique potteries made by hand and fired at a low temperature. A century later, the Villa Katsura was a refuge for the imperial family, where they could contemplate nature, especially when moonlight played among the fountains. In the 20th century it became a place of pilgrimage for architects of the future Modernist movement, who were fascinated by the refined volumes, economy of materials and effects, and intelligent planning.

Paris News / Cult of the Gesture and the Eternal Return of Japonisme

Last Autumn, as a reaction to the frenzied pace of the fashion world, Musée Galliera curator Olivier Saillard (in conjunction with Tilda Swinton) produced *Eternity Dress*, his second theatrical staging with a fashion theme: a contemplative and almost silent work, exploring the time-honoured rituals of cutting and fitting that lead on to the birth of that mysterious object we call a dress. In the world of cooking utensils, a tiny French company has carved itself a slice of success by appearing in the catalogue of the New York MoMa. *The Malle W Troussau* is a family story – one of transmission, involving food lovers who packed the most durable knives, pans, aprons and vegetable-scrapers into a light, modern case... Meanwhile contemporary Japanese pastry-making, all about delicate textures and fleeting flavours, is beginning to titillate Paris – and is to be savoured like a breath of Spring air.
